"We want to bring the fun back into reading for pleasure, not just to pass a test. Our new library is place where we share and review books, explore different experiences and enhance our imaginations, get better at reading, build our confidence and resilience, celebrate our authors, poets and actors, and create our own stories."

Headteacher Jenny Lewis was full of smiles as she cut the ribbon to open Thornhill Primary School's new library, marking the end of a long journey, with a two-year fundraising campaign to raise the money to convert an unused part of the school into a fabulous new reading space. Thornhill's Foundation, set up by a group of parents and the senior leadership team to help fundraise towards big projects for the school, took the lead and ran an incredible campaign over two years, raising just over £170,000 to help the dream come true. Parents, grandparents, neighbours, Islington residents and everyone who supported a child at a fundraising event, whether it

gave a little and together raised a lot. Support also came from grants, including the Richard

Reeves Foundation and Garfield Weston, and larger donations from private individuals and organizations such as Islington Square, Hamptons International and Third Space. Their help meant that in addition to building the library, there was also funding for our new school librarian Cler Lewis. Cler is trained in many different pursuits, not only a fully-qualified librarian but also a yoga instructor, mindfulness teacher, and she even helps run a food bank. Cler brings a warm calmness to the library, decorating it for different topics, suggesting new purchases, as well as helping promote a love of literature amongst the pupils. When she first arrived, she exclaimed "These children really love reading, I've never seen anything like it!".

pupils, who were given materials to design their own 'dream libraries'. This helped to define the design brief and is one of the reasons we now have such an exciting reading space. Since opening the new library has become a focal point for literature and learning at the heart of the school. Not only a place to read and borrow books, it is a place to fire imaginations while providing a quiet refuge to read, think and study independently. There is not one pupil who hasn't snuggled up in the tunnel with a new book to delve into. And so to everyone who has been a part of the campaign

we want to say a huge 'thank you'.
